## Pinot Noir Found to be Main Ingredient in Viagra

**April 1, 2011, (CA):** A consortium of distinguished Pinot Noir winemakers in California have released the startling results of clandestine research carried out over the past five years. Deep in the wine cellars of several prominent wineries, chemical analyses have been secretly carried out and have revealed that Pinot Noir extract is the primary ingredient in Viagra.
